

This is not a traditional cook book. It is a snapshot of the past. It is a glimpse into the life of Mme. Begue (pronounced "bay-gay") the beloved restaurateur who served "The Second Breakfast" or Brunch to thousands upon thousands of New Orleans tourist and residents. The first part of the book is a lively history lessons that chronicles Mme. Begue life and accomplishments. The remaining 3/4 is filled with recipes. Lots and lots of recipes. Most of are written in a conversational style that is an exact translation of Elizabeth Begue's original French recipes. And about 20 of the recipes have been update to a style more familiar with 21st century cooks. In Poppy Tooker's words: "The resulting text is more of a culinary guidebook, a passport to a time long past." So an enjoyable read with lots of interesting recipes. Take a look at the (Hogs) Head Cheese (p 93). It sounds really unappealing but it tastes like heaven. Below is a list of the recipes contained in the book.
